# Appreciate Your Flaws *by Tiana Mortimer, Executive Director*

I'm not fond of the multitude of jokes and stories emailed to me at work from friends and acquaintances. In fact, I confess to deleting many without even reading them. However, I received a short story that I wanted to share with you, because it contains a powerful lesson all of us should always remember before we judge others for being different or worse, judging ourselves too harshly. The story is called "The Cracked Pot":

*A water bearer in India had two large pots, each hung on the ends of a pole which he carried across his neck. One of the pots had a crack in it, while the other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water. At the end of the long walk from the stream to the house, the cracked pot arrived only half full.*

*For a full two years this went on daily, with the bearer delivering*

*only one and a half pots full of water to his house. Of course, the perfect pot was proud of its accomplishments - perfect for which it was made. But the poor cracked pot was ashamed of its own imperfection, and miserable that it was able to accomplish only half of what it had been made to do.*

*After 2 years of what it perceived to be a bitter failure, it spoke to the water bearer one day by the stream. I am ashamed of myself, and I want to apologize to you. I have been able to deliver only half my load because this crack in my side causes water to leak out all the way back to your house. Because of my flaws, you have to do all of this work, and you don't get full value from your efforts, the pot said.*

*The bearer said to the pot, "Did you notice that there were flowers only on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because I have always known about*

*your flaw, and I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day while we walk back, you've watered them. For two years I have been able to pick these beautiful flowers to decorate the table. Without you being just the way you are, there would not be this beauty to grace the house."*

We all are "cracked pots" ... each of us has unique flaws. Without those "cracked pots," our lives would not be so interesting or gratifying. Appreciate each person for what they are and always look for the good in them. It is such a simple lesson, but one that is not practiced often enough. At the Fort Bend Boys Choir, we hope that we are achieving this lesson every day. After all, with 200 active boys at any given time, there is definitely our share of "cracked pots!" 🎵

# Where Are They Now?

Approximately 13 years ago this alumnus started his career in the Fort Bend Boys Choir and then graduated to Alumni Land after the 1993 summer performance tour to the Carolinas. This issue of *Vocal Notes* is spotlighting this soon-to-be Harvard senior, **Victor Ban**. Because **Victor** provided us with such eloquent answers to our questions, the transcript below is just a brief snapshot of his life since the Choir.

**FBBC:** **Victor**, did you get to travel during your tenure with the Fort Bend Boys Choir? And if so what was your favorite place?

**Victor:** During the 1993 summer tour, Asheville, NC was my favorite stop and the Blue Ridge Mountains were a spectacular site. Also, I will always remember sliding down this natural sliding rock waterslide somewhere in the woods of North Carolina and goofing off with my roommates Beau, Jamie and Zeke.

**FBBC:** What was your most memorable experience?

**Victor:** My most memorable experience was a recurring one rather than a single event: our singing the song "A Parting Blessing." The Tour choir would often close our concerts with this short but incredibly beautiful piece. Even today, I find myself humming the middle alto part in my more sentimental moments. **Mr. Adams** said that the choir hasn't sung the song in a while, though. Here are the lyrics, if my memory hasn't failed me:

*May the road rise to meet you/ May the wind be always at  
your back/ May  
the sun shine warm upon your face/ May the rain fall soft  
upon your  
fields/ And until we meet again/ May God hold you in the  
palm of His hand.*

**FBBC:** What have you been doing since graduating to Alumni Land?

**Victor:** After FBBC, I entered Dulles Middle School. Middle school was an interesting time, I learned what it meant to be cool and, well, be me I guess. Looking back, I'm glad that I didn't change that much. ha ha...

I started playing trumpet and really enjoyed the marching band. Senior year, I started to look hard into Christianity, something that had fascinated me but I felt I hadn't fully "experienced." That year was definitely one of transition and transformation, spiritually and academically.

In the fall of 2000, I entered Harvard as a freshman. I joined the Christian Fellowship and also did some design for a student magazine called Diversity & Distinction. I didn't really know what I wanted to study but thought I'd figure that out sooner or later.

I chose to major in History, which was somewhat surprising to me, since I didn't find history that interesting in middle and high school, with a few exceptions. That summer, I

realized that I appreciated much of the history I had learned in a few classes I had taken freshman year and also spoke with some people who had studied history in college. I was drawn to learning about the past, about the struggles and ideas that transformed people and nations. In the fall, I joined the history department with a focus in intellectual history. Sophomore year flew by, as did this year... classes have been challenging but also quite interesting. This year, outside of class, I led a Bible study and played trumpet in a mariachi band. I also began thinking more about harder questions about the Christian faith that go beyond religious experience... how does history intersect with faith? How does a just God work in a seemingly unjust world? To what extent can I ask difficult questions and yet hold onto faith? St Anselm, an eleventh century theologian wrote: "For I do not seek to understand, in order that I may believe; but I believe, that I may understand." Can this belief be suspended when faith needs to be examined critically or when I enter into dialogue with people of other faiths? Some friends and I are about to start an online forum to explore the philosophy, theology, and history of Christianity... I'm very excited about that and hope it bears fruit over the summer and beyond.

In my spare time, I think about less weighty matters and enjoy going to choir concerts to hear my friends sing!

**FBBC:** What advice would you give our current choristers and potential choirboys?

**Victor:** Never stop singing! And go to bed early — this habit will serve you well in college, believe me. Try to be friends with your parents... they're less weird than you might think. Some words that have been an encouragement to me over the years: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths." (Proverbs 3:5-6)

**FBBC:** What impact did the Fort Bend Boys Choir have on you?

**Victor:** The choir gave me an appreciation and sense for musicality that has stayed with me over the years. On a more basic level, I learned how to work with others toward a wonderful end. As **Mr. A** used to say, "Perfect practice makes perfect." Also, I ALWAYS think about my FBBC years whenever I say "yes, ma'am" or "yes, sir."

**FBBC:** Anything else you want to share with our Choir readership? Hobbies, future plans, etc.?

**Victor:** I love school, so I'm just trying to enjoy what I'm doing now. I'd like to work for a few years after school, perhaps as a high school teacher or with the Peace Corps, before deciding if I want to study more history in grad school.

Thank you **Victor** for giving us an up close and personal look into your life today. We hope that you continue to have music in your life. **Martin Luther** once said, "Music is one of the fairest and most glorious gifts of God." We are pleased that you were able to use that gift. Good luck on your senior year at Harvard! 🎵

The study was conducted by two firms: Robinson & Muenster Associates, Inc. from Sioux Falls, South Dakota and GSC Communications, Inc. from Swarthmore, Pennsylvania. The sum effect of the study's itemized overall findings is that:

- \* Interest in choral singing develops early in life and is influenced by school and family experiences. Over five million children perform publicly in choirs on a regular basis.
- \* Early introduction is the key to lifelong interest in choral singing and sets the stage for many positive and personal benefits through that experience.
- \* Choral singers are more highly involved in their communities, not only in the arts but in other positive social and civic activities as well.
- \* Choral singers overwhelmingly report that choral participation improves their lives and their contributions to society in many ways.
- \* More people (children and adults) participate in choral singing than in any other performing art - singing is by far the most popular public arts activity in America ♪
